Adverse possession, sometimes colloquially described as squatter's rights, is a legal principle that applies when a person who does not have legal title to a piece of property—usually land (real property)—attempts to claim legal ownership based upon a history of possession or occupation of the land without the owner's consent. A claim for possession of land commences when someone files a claim in court.
